

### **RCPCH Child Protection Standing Committee (CPSC)**

**Key updates: February-March 2023:** please share this briefing of updates with any relevant colleagues working across safeguarding and child protection.

Dear Colleagues,

I wanted to give you an update on the work of the Committee and information on other key areas and publications you might find useful. There are a few issues I need to specifically mention to you as follows:

- 1. I expect that most of you are aware of the <u>Child Safeguarding Practice Review Panel</u> <u>briefing on Bruising in non-mobile infants</u> which was published in September 2022. The RCPCH did submit evidence on this topic to the panel. It is important to note the recommendation that whilst not all marks on a non-mobile infant necessarily require a Section 47 enquiry, any paediatric assessment of the infant needs to be carried out in the context of both information sharing and a multi-agency discussion.
- 2. The RCPCH is aware that the joint guidance the <u>radiological investigation of suspected</u> <u>physical abuse in children</u> is due for revision. Our radiology colleagues will be leading on this. Until the guidance is revised, it still stands. There have been some concerns that not all skeletal surveys are being completed with follow up films. As with all guidance, it has to be applied by clinicians with knowledge and experience who may deviate from it following discussions with radiology colleagues, if they can justify this and the justification is fully documented.
- 3. You may be aware that there is a plan for patients to have direct electronic access to their GP health records. This is currently only partially implemented. The degree of access that parents have, when their access is turned off and when a young person's access is turned on is currently under discussion. There are some sensitive documents that paediatricians share with GPs that may require in-person explanation and communication or may not be shared until court proceedings allow this. The RCPCH are therefore recommending that sensitive documents such as child protection reports, LAC assessments and adoption reports are marked clearly 'NOT FOR ELECTRONIC ACCESS' on the front page when being shared with primary care. It is important to note that this does not necessarily guarantee that reports will not be shared electronically, but in most cases we expect GP practices to follow this recommendation. If a report is particularly sensitive, how to proceed may need to be discussed with the GP practice safeguarding lead and your organisational safeguarding lead.

This will be my last communication to you as RCPCH Officer for Child Protection as my 5-year term has come to an end. We have appointed a new Officer for Child Protection, Professor Andrew Rowland. Andrew is a Consultant Paediatrician in Manchester and an Honorary Professor (Children's Rights, Law, and Advocacy) at the University of Salford. Find out more about him <u>here</u>.

### **RCPCH Recent and Upcoming publications**

We have responded to the proposed 'Illegal Migration Bill' which can be found on our website <u>here</u>

We have understandably received messages of concern from some of our members, particularly those who carry out health assessments for children and young people arriving in the UK to seek asylum. These paediatricians may be given information by the young person about their journey and mode of entry, which will be recorded in the child's medical records. It is unlikely to be relevant or necessary for the ongoing safeguarding and wellbeing for that child to have those details repeated in the following medical report, and the only obligation on you as a paediatrician is to record the specific health needs that arise from the information a child or young person provides you with.
